INSTRUMENT, OR VOICE. CURRENTLY MORE THAN 150 STUDENTS
TAKE PRIVATE LESSONS AND AN EVEN GREATER NUMBER
PARTICIPATE IN CHORAL AND INSTRUMENTAL ENSEMBLES.

MUSIC AT CENTRE

Centre offers a bachelor of arts degree with a music major or minor. Because of our small class size and excellent student-to-faculty ratio, we are able to tailor our offerings to individual student's needs and interests in studying abroad. Several of Centre's ensembles tour both nationally and internationally. Centre's music majors go on to graduate study at first-rate universities, establish careers in performance, enter all levels of teaching from elementary through college/university, serve in the ministry or in military music ensembles, and work in arts administration and recording engineering. Music alumni are also doctors, lawyers, business leaders, and professionals in many other fields. Students not majoring in music have equal access to most courses and to all areas of applied music and music ensembles.

INSTRUMENTAL ENSEMBLES

Students of all majors are welcome to perform in any of the instrumental ensembles. All of the following ensembles are one-credit-hour courses except for Pep Band, which is an extracurricular activity:

- African Drum Ensemble
- Centre Orchestra
- Centre Percussion
- Centre Wind Ensemble
- CentreJazz
- Kentucky Music Ensemble
- Pep Band

CHORAL ENSEMBLES

The music program offers a range of choral ensembles. Except for CommonTime, an extracurricular vocal group, each of the following ensembles is a one credit hour course:

- Centre College Choir (offered fall term) performs works for SATB chorus.
- Centre Concert Choir (offered spring term) performs a larger choral-orchestral work.
- Centre Singers is the premier choir and regularly tours nationally and abroad.
- CommonTime is Centre's student-run a cappella group

LESSONS

Outstanding instructors offer lessons in voice, piano, organ, harpsichord, guitar, banjo, fiddle, mandolin, composition, and standard orchestral and band instruments. Lessons are open to all students of the college. Student showcases, solo recitals, and solo performances with orchestra provide advanced students ample opportunity to display their skills.

MUSIC COURSES

Centre's music program is designed to help students develop analytical, critical, and performance skills through the study of music. Introductory courses in music appreciation, world music, jazz history, film music, the history of rock, and music theory require only a minimum of musical background. The music major and minor integrate the study of music history and theory in advanced topic courses such as the symphony, opera, American music, Romanticism, Modernism, counterpoint, The Beatles, conducting, and orchestration.

FACILITIES

Many performances take place in the College's Norton Center for the Arts. The complex has a 1,500-seat concert hall and a smaller auditorium, both designed for professional as well as student use. A 90-seat recital hall provides the perfect atmosphere and acoustics for student recitals and small ensemble performances. Large rehearsal rooms, practice rooms, a music theory lab with electronic music workstations, dressing rooms, a costume shop, a scene shop, classrooms, music studios, drama studios, and faculty offices complete the arts center.

ARTS EVENTS

Students receive free tickets to performances by the world-class artists who appear at the Norton Center for the Arts throughout the year. Some of these international artists offer master classes and lecture demonstrations that are open to student participants and observers. Recent or upcoming performers include Gregg Allman, Joshua Bell, Tony Bennett, Robert Cray, David Crosby, Dublin Guitar Quartet, Bela Fleck, Foreigner, Stanley Jordan, Kiri Te Kanawa, Alison Krauss, Kronos Quartet, Yo-Yo Ma, Wynton Marsalis, Dolly Parton, Punch Brothers, Smash Mouth, They Might Be Giants, Tokyo String Quartet, Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra, and ZZ Top.

MUSIC SCHOLARSHIPS

Centre offers competitive music scholarships — up to \$7500 annually — to talented students regardless of their intended major. The awards are renewable for all four years and qualify students for reduced-fee private lessons. An application and an on-campus audition (or taped audition by prior arrangement) are required.
