

# CENTRE-IN-WASHINGTON

## STUDY AWAY PROGRAM



PARTNERING WITH BUTLER UNIVERSITY, CENTRE SENDS STUDENTS TO WASHINGTON, D.C., WHERE THEY COMPLETE INTERNSHIPS AND TAKE COURSES THAT FOCUS ON THE NATION'S CAPITAL. STUDENTS RECEIVE SIX HOURS OF P/F INTERNSHIP CREDIT, AND OCCASIONALLY ARE PAID FOR THEIR INTERNSHIPS.

### ELIGIBILITY

All rising Centre juniors and seniors in good standing are invited to apply. Students can take part in both the Washington program and a long-term study abroad trip (as well as CentreTerm study abroad trips.)

### LOCATION AND HOUSING IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

Students live in apartment suites in a facility across the street from the Supreme Court building on Capitol Hill. The facility is overseen by the W.I.S.H. (Washington Intern Student Housing) agency, with whom Centre has worked with for many years. This prime location puts our students within easy walking distance to offices and agencies where many of them intern. It is also near the transportation and Metro hub at Union Station. The newly refurbished apartments are fully furnished with all utilities, wireless internet, kitchenware, cookware, central air conditioning, free laundry and iron/ironing boards. They have an on-site building manager, 24-hour emergency maintenance, and office staff. No alcohol or overnight guests are allowed in the building.

### COURSES

Students take two three-hour courses — **City as Text: A D.C. Exploration**, and **Art & Architecture in Washington**. These classes meet in the evenings, with field trips and other meetings on some weekends.

Students also take three "Washington Weekend Seminars." These are one-hour P/F courses on specific topics in and around Washington. They are taught by faculty members from Centre and Butler University on Thursday evenings with further discussion and site visits on Fridays and possibly Saturday mornings. They have been very popular with students in the past, covering Political Polling, International Sports Marketing, Federal War on Drugs, Declaration of Independence, History of the Holocaust Museum, World after 9/11, Washington Theatre, Science and Public Policy, and American Islam.

### COST

Students pay a \$575 non-refundable deposit/surcharge; \$200 of this amount is returned after completing the first week of the program. Housing costs in Washington are double what



they are on campus, but food costs (students buy and prepare their own meals) are less. **So that students end up paying about the same amount for this program that they'd pay in Danville**, students are billed 95% of their term bill and use the 5% they are not billed (about \$1,250) for their food costs.

### HOW TO APPLY

Applications and faculty recommendation forms can be picked up at the Center for Global Citizenship. Students should give the recommendation forms to your faculty recommenders early in January. Completed application and faculty recommendation forms should be returned to the Center for Global Citizenship no later than February 15.

### PRE-REGISTRATION / CONVOCATION CREDITS

While in D.C., students pre-register for future courses via email with their regular academic advisor. Students will automatically be credited with six convocation credits during their term abroad.

### DEPOSIT DUE AT CASHIER'S OFFICE BY MARCH 15

In order to hold a slot if they are selected, students pay the non-refundable \$575 deposit/surcharge at the Cashier's Office in Horky House by March 15.
